A Week in the Liturgy


Below is a daily listing of the Scripture readings used in daily Mass and reflections corresponding to these Scriptural passages.

THIRTEENTH WEEK IN ORDINARY TIME

MONDAY, June 28 MEMORIAL
 St. Irenaeus, bishop, martyr 
 Amos 2:6-10, 13-16 Matthew 8:18-22
FIRST READING: Through Amos prophecy, the Lord denounces the oppression of the outcast and poor, by the people the Lord himself freed from an oppressor's hand. The people have forsaken the Lord and given in to idolatry, for in their oppression they extol themselves as they trample others underfoot. Gratitude for our liberation ought to manifest itself in our efforts to liberate, not to oppress, the needy.


GOSPEL: As people step forward from the crowd to pledge a life of discipleship, Jesus underscores the radical nature of following him. The embrace of homelessness, and severing ties with place and family, suggests the forsaking of two realities that provide security and stability to life. Jesus teaches that following him requires that we find security and stability in him alone. Like Abraham, our father in faith, we are called to a radical trust in following the Lord


TODAY'S SAINT:  Saint Irenaeus was the Bishop of Lyons, France, a disciple of Saint Polycarp of Smyrna, and one of the first Christian theologians. His best known work, *Against Heresies*, is an attack on the Gnostics, who claimed to have a secret oral tradition from Jesus. Irenaeus refutes them by pointing out that we know who the bishops are back to the apostles, and that none of them were gnostic. He is an early witness to the recognition of the four accounts of the Gospel, to the unique importance of the Bishop of Rome and to the Apostolic Succession—the descent of the hierarchy from the apostles themselves.

TUESDAY, June 29 SOLEMNITY
 STS. PETER AND PAUL, APOSTLES 
 Acts 12:1-11 2 Timothy 4:6-8, 17-18 Matthew 16:13-19
FIRST READING: Peter's liberation from a prison cell through the ministry of an angel speaks of God's desire to liberate us from whatever hinders us from proclaiming his word. While some hindrances are externally imposed, at other times we are imprisoned from within by chains of our own making. May the Lord free us from all that imprisons us so that we may be free to proclaim his love and mercy.

SECOND READING: As he comes to the end of his life, Paul attests to his profound confidence in God's faithful love. Paul is not so confident in his own accomplishments for the faith, as in God's work through and in him. When we approach the end of our journey, we too are called to confidence in God's love.

GOSPEL: Peter's confession, voicing the faith of the whole Church, becomes the occasion for Jesus to acclaim his trust in his body, the Church, to live his mission with fidelity and love. The Lord's trust stems from his own love, mission, and fidelity to the Father. The Lord's love for all people led him to found the Church through which his saving presence would remain visibly present in the world.

TODAY'S SAINTS:  Today we commemorate Peter and Paul, martyred on this date around the year 64 during Nero's persecution following the Great Fire of Rome. Tradition says that Peter fled Rome to avoid arrest and saw Jesus on the road. "Where are you going, Lord?" Peter asked. Jesus replied, "I am going to Rome to be crucified again." Peter turned back and was crucified upside down because he felt unworthy to meet his death the same way as Christ. Paul was arrested in Jerusalem and was sent to Rome, where he was placed under house arrest. He was slain by beheading, because as a Roman citizen he could not be subjected to the indignity of crucifixion.

WEDNESDAY, June 30 Weekday 
The First Holy Martyrs of the Holy Roman Church


Amos 5:14-15, 21-24 Matthew 8:28-34
FIRST READING: Amos proclaims God's displeasure at empty worship; not the literal worship of idols, but worship unaccompanied by acts of justice and goodness. Beautiful melodies and sacrificial offerings ring as hollow as purposeless noise and are unacceptable to the Lord when the poor and oppressed are not granted justice.

GOSPEL: Jesus' encounter with the demoniacs reveals to us that the evil one trembles in the presence of Jesus in fear. The demons plead with Jesus to expel them into a herd of swine that will rush to drown in the sea. In our human weakness we may find ourselves intimidated by evil; yet, the Lord who lives in us quells our fear and overcomes evil's power.

THURSDAY, July 1 Weekday 
Blessed Junipero Serra, priest
 Amos 7:10-17 Matthew 9:1-8

FIRST READING: Instead of eliciting repentance, Amos' prophetic challenge leads to a call for his own banishment. Amos protests that his banishment is an affront to God. His protest manifests that the people refuse to heed God's word. Amos was not a prophet by choice, but by God's call: a humble shepherd called to proclaim his prophetic word.

GOSPEL: Jesus' healing of a paralytic by the proclamation of the forgiveness of his sins is a bold proclamation of Jesus' intimate relationship with God. Since Jesus himself acknowledges that the call to stand and walk would have produced the same physical healing, his choice to underscore his share in the capacity to forgive sins cannot be glossed over. Jesus comes to forgive sins; God has visited his people.


FRIDAY, July 2 Weekday 
 Amos 8:4-6, 9-12 Matthew 9:9-13
FIRST READING: Amos decries the oppression of the poor and the evil plotting that secures their oppression. He prophesies a future time of famine for the oppressors; not a famine of food and drink, but of God's word. The oppressor, who will not find satisfaction in evil, will seek the living God, but his voice will be silent; his voice will not be heard among them.

GOSPEL: Jesus' fidelity to his mission finds him among the outcasts and sinners, a positioning detested by Jesus' adversaries. Yet, Jesus proclaims and lives the compassion of God drawing near to those in need of his rejuvenating love. As Christ's Church, we must find ourselves seated at the table with outcasts and sinners witnessing to the gracious favor of God that we ourselves have received. Compassion breeds union, not division or separation.

SATURDAY, July 3 FEAST 
 ST. THOMAS, APOSTLE
 Ephesians 2:19-22 John 20:24-29

FIRST READING: Paul writes of the dynamism that marks the life of the Church, as it is being built up into a dwelling place for God. As we are drawn into the life of Christ, all division among us ceases, and we become heirs of the teaching of the apostles and prophets. Our new life is no solitary existence, but a sharing in a community of faith, life, and witness.

GOSPEL: Thomas proclamation of faith in the risen Christ as Lord and God follows upon Jesus' invitation to him to probe his wounds, the criteria Thomas himself set for his profession of faith. Jesus longs for our faith; not for himself but for us, so that in his wounds our wounds will be healed, and so that by sharing in his suffering we might rise with him to eternal life.

TODAY'S SAINT:  Thomas, also called "Didymus" or "the Twin," was one of the Twelve Apostles. He is remembered for doubting the Resurrection of Christ: "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands and put my finger into the nail marks and put my hand into his side, I will not believe." Thomas is with the Twelve when Jesus appears and chides him for his lack of faith: "Have you come to believe because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed." The people of Kerala in South India fervently believe that it was Thomas who evangelized them.



From the Pastor's Desk...

Dear Parishioners,

After a week away, it is good to be back home!

The context for this Sunday's gospel is that Jesus is "resolutely determined" to go to Jerusalem, and this sets the tone for the next months of Ordinary Time.

On our own journey to the end of the liturgical year in November (hardly on our minds at this point in June!) we must be resolute about hearing the gospel faithfully and following Jesus, even when that means we, too, are going to "Jerusalem," which symbolizes the ongoing dying to self that is what living the paschal mystery really is.

We hear the gospel faithfully when that gospel is lived in our everyday circumstances. Hearing is more than words going into our ears; it demands of us resolute action. The gospels often are challenging. This one challenges us to go to Jerusalem with Jesus, and by being his faithful followers "the kingdom of God" is at hand through us. This ought to be all the motivation we need!

Only two more weeks until our parish picnic!! We are still looking for volunteers to help in any capacity as we prepare to celebrate our third anniversary as a parish.

As you know, one of our signature events of the picnic is the basket raffle. Once again, we need your help in getting baskets made. Pick a theme. Assemble the contents for your basket. Pastoral Ministry
with Senior Members...

In today's gospel story we have a person called only "someone" say to Jesus, "I will follow you wherever you go."

I heard a story recently of a young child in the "olden days" of the early 1940s who told one of her classmates what she was going to do on her First Communion Day. She said she was going to come piously back from Communion, cover her heart with her hands and then lay back and die from the sheer joy of it. You can tell she had listened long and well to the story of Blessed Imelda. (For those who don't remember this story: Imelda was a young child in the days when you had to be a little older to receive Eucharist. She longed to receive Communion and as the story goes one day the host floated through the air and hovered above her. She was then given Communion after which she prayed fervently and died.)

"I will follow you wherever you go." A great thought for fervent children but it gets a little harder as we age. The woman in this story, who is living still, learned as all of us do that the following of Jesus is carried out in every step of our daily life, not just in wonderful liturgical moments.

Haven't we all had a time of finding that very real distractions seemed to get in the way of the wholehearted innocence of saying "I will follow wherever."

Just recently I heard a report on one of the latest surveys that was taken. In it, older folks were asked how happy they were. They indicated that their happiness level was higher now than at any point in their lives. Could it be that for mature Christians the following of Jesus has helped to give them purpose and joy?

Though our bodies may have more aches and pains than at any other time in our lives, we probably are more straightforward now in our following of Jesus. Looking back we can see clearly that path we were on. Looking ahead is less important to us as we age... each day is sufficient in itself.

Church language gives us a phrase for this kind of living. It is called "living in the present moment." Many of the saints practiced this well. The story is told of a saint who was enjoying a good game of cards and some pious folks thought this not such a good thing to be doing and asked what he would do if he was told he would die in the next minute or two. Without hesitating he said that he would keep playing cards. I think he had a pretty deep understanding of "I will follow." That kind of following encompasses every moment of our lives.

Lord Jesus,
let me find joy rather than burden
in following you each day.
