A Week in the Liturgy

Sunday is not the only day we should pray and bless the Lord. As individuals and as families all are encouraged to meditate daily on the Sacred Scriptures and read about the lives of the holy men and women that have blessed our Church. Below is a daily listing of the Scripture readings used in daily Mass and reflections corresponding to these Scriptural passages. Jesus asked his apostles in the Garden of Gethsemane if they could not stay up and pray with him for one hour. Can we not find a few minutes each day to spend with our Lord in prayer?

FIFTEENTH WEEK IN ORDINARY TIME

MONDAY, July 12 Weekday 
 Isaiah 1:10-17 Matthew 10:34-11:1 
FIRST READING: Isaiah denounces the emptiness of Israel's prayer and votive offerings and likens the present state of the nation to Sodom and Gomorrah. The heart of the people is far from the Lord. The multiplication of such prayer is futile, for God will give ear only to prayer enlivened with a life of justice and a living faith.
GOSPEL: As Jesus entrusts his ministry to the disciples, he cautions them that their relationship to him must be their first priority. When **Jesus is a disciple's first priority, the disciple discovers that he or she is truly an ambassador for Jesus.** The disciple is privileged to be the presence of Christ in the world.

TUESDAY, July 13 Weekday 
 Isaiah 7:109 Matthew 11:20-24 
FIRST READING: In the face of attack on several fronts, Isaiah calls Ahaz, king of Judah, to remain tranquil and to trust in God's fidelity to Judah. Judah's strength comes not from human device, but from its faith in God. In times of adversity, we too are called to trust in the Lord.
GOSPEL: Jesus' harsh rebuke of the cities of Chorazin, Bethsaida, and Capernaum is a stark reminder to us that the Lord truly expects that upon hearing his message we will reform our lives. This reform is not limited to individual lives, but to the life of entire communities.


WEDNESDAY, July 14 Memorial 
 Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha, virgin 
 Isaiah 10:5-7, 13b-16 Matthew 11:25-27 
FIRST READING: Isaiah proclaims that the Lord of history will use a foreign power to bring God's people into submission. God has so arranged it that Assyria will overwhelm Israel with little effort without the fluttering of a bird's wing or a chirping from its mouth. The prosperity of God's people shall be taken away.
GOSPEL: Jesus rejoices in the Father's goodness. Through Jesus, God has been revealed to the merest children. Knowing God is not a matter of human cleverness or astuteness; it is a matter of being open to receive a share in the life of the one who created us and called us into being. As a child accepts the gift of life from its parents, so we are called to accept the gift of relationship with God.



TODAY'S SAINT: Blessed Kateri, daughter of a Mohawk warrior and Catholic Algonquin woman, was born in a Mohawk fortress near Auriesville, New York. Her parents and brother died in a smallpox epidemic and she was left with scars and weakened eyesight. **Kateri's mother had made an impression on her and she was baptized on Easter Sunday in 1676.** Her conversion to Christianity caused her relatives to mistreat her, and so Kateri fled to a community of Native American Christians at Kahnawake, Quebec. Kateri

died at 24 and is called "Lily of the Mohawks," the first Native American to be beatified.







THURSDAY, July 15 Memorial 
 St. Bonaventure, bishop, doctor of the Church

Isaiah 26:7-9, 12, 16-19 Matthew 23:8-12
FIRST READING: Isaiah poetically speaks to our deep human desire for God, the futility of our efforts to bring salvation, and his power to raise people from the dead. In our human weakness, our struggle to bring forth new life produces nothing but wind; yet with God all things, even resurrection from the dead, is possible.

GOSPEL: Jesus compassionately summons the weary to himself so that the gift of refreshment might be theirs. Our own self-imposed burdens can be quite onerous. However, the burden imposed on us by our discipleship is easy and light, for the Lord walks by our side and carries the burden with us.

TODAY'S SAINT: Saint Bonaventure, scholastic theologian and philosopher, was born in Italy and joined the Franciscans in 1243. He studied theology at Paris with his great contemporary, Thomas Aquinas, and after teaching for a time was chosen minister general of the **Franciscans in 1257. Bonaventure is called the "seraphic doctor"** because his love of God is so evident, even in his philosophical writings. When the Council of Lyons was called to bring the Greek and Latin churches back together, Bonaventure went at the request of Pope **Gregory X, but he died before the Council's work was finished.**

FRIDAY, July 16 Weekday 
 Our Lady of Mt. Carmel 
 Isaiah 38:1-6, 21-22, 7-8 Matthew 12:1-8
FIRST READING: Isaiah's warning to Hezekiah concerning his impending death lead Hezekiah to entreat the Lord's merciful kindness. Hezekiah's fidelity to the Lord moves God to grant his request for healing and to turn back the wrath of the Assyrians. Our fidelity to God is rewarded in manifold ways.
GOSPEL: In response to criticism concerning his disciples' adherence to the Sabbath laws, Jesus goes well beyond defending their action. He declares himself as Son of Man, to be "Lord of the Sabbath." The Sabbath laws are meant not to restrict human action, but to occasion awareness of the mercy of God, who invites us to share abundantly in his life.

SATURDAY, July 17 Weekday 
 Micah 2:1-5 Matthew 12:14-21 
FIRST READING: Micah denounces the evil plotting of those who strip others of their ancestral heritage. He declares that God will condemn with like punishment the members of his household who plot and execute evil.
GOSPEL: As he cures the sick, Jesus asks that they remain silent about his saving action. Matthew suggests that this call fulfills the prophecy of Isaiah, concerning the redeemer who proclaims salvation to the Gentiles. Those cured are to be silent, for Jesus will remain silent **as he is led to judgment. Jesus' healing and reconciling acts speak for themselves as our actions, at times, speak for themselves.**

Pastoral Ministry with Senior Members...

Today's Gospel story tells of the man who asked Jesus for clarification on what was necessary for eternal life. Jesus asked him what the Jewish law said and he without hesitation quoted that famous, "You shall love the Lord

ending with "and your neighbor as yourself." But the man couldn't leave it at that and so he asked Jesus that all important question, "**Who is my neighbor?**"

Jesus, as he often did, told a story rather than give a simple answer. And we all know well the story of the Good Samaritan that Jesus told, followed by the question, "**who was neighbor?**"

It is pretty easy to answer that question listening to the story Jesus told. But haven't we all found out that it is a whole lot harder in our daily lives in 2010 to answer that question.

You don't have to be any expert on the political climate in our country to know that a whole lot of us want to forget the question altogether. It is easier to say, "me first" than to ask, "Who is my neighbor and what can I do to help them?" Many of us would rewrite the Good Samaritan story and say something like this, "A fellow was traveling along and he didn't take enough precautions for himself and so really it was his own fault that he was robbed and beat up. Some good people came near to him but who could blame them for being afraid to be involved, because after all they were older or really busy and so they left the man lay there figuring that someone else, maybe younger or stronger or with more time could come along and help. After all you can't be too careful."

Yes, this story runs quite differently from the story Jesus told. However on the last day I think the story we will hear, like it or not, is the story from the gospel.

As we look in the mirror each morning maybe our question for the day should be, "**Who is my neighbor?**" A pesky question to be sure but one that for mature followers of Jesus can't really be avoided.

And so we pray:

Lord, today as I listen to the news
I hear your question,
"Who is your neighbor?"

Lord, today as I relate to family and friends,
I hear your question,
"Who is your neighbor?"

Lord, as I prepare to go to bed,
as I review this day
I hear your question,
"Who is your neighbor?"

Lord, engrave this question on my heart.

FAITH FACTS The Samaritans

The Samaritans were a mixture of Israelites and foreign settlers who disagreed with the other Israelites about how God should be worshipped. The Samaritans would not worship at the temple in Jerusalem. They had their own temple on Mount Gerizim. There was a lot of hostility between the Samaritans and the other Israelites. Most Jews looked down on the Samaritans. It is interesting that Jesus told a story in which the "good neighbor" is a Samaritan.
